
GHOST DOG ALPHA & TINT TUTORIAL

- 1. Create a new Flash Document in Actionscript 2.0
- 2. Import the picture of Zero. File ->Import-> Import to Library->zero.png

Part I: Animating a Gradual Background Color Change

- 1. Go to your timeline. Rename Layer 1 "background."
- 2. Click on the rectangle tool.
- 3. Draw a rectangle that covers the entire stage (the white part of the screen). It does not matter what color your rectangle is. We will change it later.
- 4. Double click on the rectangle to select it. Right click (or control+click) -> convert to symbol -> convert to movie clip. Name the movie clip "background_rectangle."
- 5. Click on the selection tool
- 6. Click on the background rectangle. Click on the properties inspector.
- 7. Find "color effect" in the properties inspector. Select "tint" and change it to "100%."




- 8. Click on the box next to "tint" and select a shade of purple.
- 9. Go to your timeline. Right click (or control + click) on frame 24, right click (or control + click), and select "insert keyframe."
- 10. Click on the purple rectangle on the stage to select it.
- 11. Go to your properties inspector. Find "color effect" in the properties inspector. Make sure "tint" is still set to "100%." Click on the box next to "tint" and select a shade of blue.
- 12. Go to your timeline. Right click (or control + click) anywhere between frame 2 and 23, and select "create classic tween."
- 13. Your timeline should now look like this:



Part II: Animating a Fade in


1. Make a new layer. Name it "ghost dog." Make sure it is on top of the background layer.




2. Click on the Libraries panel. Select "zero.png" and drag it onto the stage.




- 3. Right click (or control + click) on the ghost dog image -> convert to symbol -> convert to movie clip. Name the movie clip "zero."
- 4. Find "color effect" in the properties inspector. Select "alpha" and change it to "100%."



- 5. Go to your timeline. Right click (or control + click) on frame 24 on the ghost dog layer and select "insert keyframe."
- 6. Click on frame 1 of your ghost dog layer. Click on the "zero" movie clip. Click on the properties inspector.
- 7. Find "color effect" in the properties inspector. Select "alpha" and change it to "0%."



- 8. Go to your timeline. Right click (or control + click) anywhere between frame 2 and 23, and select "create classic tween."
- 9. Click anywhere between frame 2 and 23 on the "ghost dog" layer of your animation. Go to the properties inspector, locate "ease," and set the "ease out" to 100.
- 10. Your timeline should now look like this:



- 11. Hit "return" to test your animation. The background should fade from purple to blue, and zero the ghost dog should fade in.
- 12. Save your movie. File -> save -> YourName_ghost.fla"
- 13. Export your movie as an SWF. File -> Export Movie -> YourName_ghost.swf"
